Principal Report

Good afternoon St Peter's Community,

I hope all our families enjoyed the two week break and have started the term refreshed and eager to embark on new learnings.

Coulstock Street

It is anticipated COULSTOCK STREET will be closed for school access for the next 6 weeks. Expected finish time Monday 21st of August.

The City of Whittlesea is continuing with their plans to upgrade the footpaths and roads around our school. Coulstock Street will be closed to all traffic whilst the work is undertaken and our Coulstock Street gate will remain locked during this period.

<u>8.30am - 8.50am:</u> Wedge Street oval gate and Wedge Street kiss and drop gate will be open for community entrance. The gates will lock at 8.50am and all students arriving after this time will enter via the school office and marked as a late arrival.

If using kiss and drop - please drive your car to the end of the kiss and drop driveway before stopping to let students exit the car. This prevents cars from stopping on the road and holding up traffic.

3.15pm- Wedge Street oval gate and Wedge Street kiss and drop gate will be open for community entrance. Families are encouraged to come into the school and meet at a pre arranged meeting place with students. Alternatively staff will supervise students exiting these gates.

<u>3.30 - 3.45pm</u> students exit the school gates. Students will exit via the oval of the kiss and drop gate for car pick up.

Students not collected by 3.45pm will be escorted to the school office.

Please be mindful of the traffic collection congestion and plan ahead with your family. We are doing our best to ensure the exit and entry of students are safe and avoiding delays.

NAIDOC Week



Our students have been involved in NAIDOC week activities this week.

Term 3 is filled with exciting Physical Activities for our students:

Middle School Gymnastics at Epping YMCA

This term our middle school students will take part in a term 3 Gymnastics program at the Epping Leisure Centre.

Year 1 and 2 Gymnastics Australian Clinics

This term our Year 1 and 2 students will participate in a 4 week gymnastics clinic at school.

Gymnastics develops physical skills of balance, coordination, flexibility and strength, as well as building self-esteem and confidence in a safe and fun environment. Our students will be involved in a recreational gymnastics program.

<u>Hooptime</u>

In the coming weeks the senior students will be invited to try out for a senior girls and boys Hooptime team. Two teams will be selected and the students will represent St Peter's in a Hooptime Basketball tournament at Mill Park Basketball stadium.

<u>Futsal</u>

In weeks 8 and 9 this term a senior boys and girls Futsal team will be given the opportunity to represent St Peter's at Futsal OZ Thomastown.



Early Departures

Where possible please make students medical appointments and other appointments outside of school hours. A number of parents are collecting students from school between 2.30 - 3.30pm, prior to the bell via the school office. The early departure is unsettling for the learning spaces and the afternoon routine. **Please only collect students prior to the bell when it is absolutely necessary.** We ask that families notify the office in the morning via email if a child is to be collected early on that day. office@stprepp.catholic.edu.au Children that leave early will be marked an afternoon absentee in accordance with our child safety compliance requirements.

Please do not collect your child early from school to avoid the after school traffic congestion.

Thank you for your support. <mark>Late arrivals</mark>

A gentle reminder the school gates close at 8.50am every morning. At this time all the students are in the learning spaces and seated. Every morning the teachers mark the roll and students begin the day with a prayer. We kindly ask that families ensure students are at school prior to 8.50am. This will ensure the students walk into the learning space with their peers and are able to be part of the morning routine. Thank you for your support.

Family Conversations and Reports

Thank you to the families that attend our Family Conversations on Monday. The conversations allowed our teachers and families to discuss student learning, achievements and to re-evaluate goals and set new goals for Semester 2. We are extremely proud of the growth our students are making.

School Uniform Transition

The start of Term 1, 2024 is the full implementation of the new school uniform. Two and a half years ago we introduced the new jumpers and the polo shirts for the school uniform.



At the commencement of 2024 the blue cotton shirts for boys and the woollen jumpers will no longer be part of the uniform. Students will also be expected to wear the correct school tracksuit. The three year transition has allowed families to slowly implement the new style of uniform.

<u>On Monday 26th June 2023 the following correspondence was sent to families via Operoo:</u>

A new enterprise agreement covering teachers across most of the Catholic schools in Victoria, including ours, has been approved and is in effect.

The new agreement delivers several positive changes for both our dedicated staff and the overall functioning of our school, including improved pay and employment conditions. One key aspect of this agreement is the inclusion of new time-in-lieu provisions, which will enable our teachers and support staff to accumulate additional time off when they are required to work more than their regular 38 hours per week which might include overnight camps and supervision at evening and weekend activities.

This change is a recognition of the considerable extra work our teachers are asked to do and will enhance their work-life balance and well-being. However, implementing these changes will mean that students will finish up a couple of days earlier than usual, on Friday 15 December, 1.30pm. This will limit any disruption to students throughout the year and enable our staff to avail themselves of their earned time off during the holiday season, rejuvenating themselves for the upcoming year.

The changes to time-in-lieu will also require us to make some slight adjustments to finish times. **From January 2024 the school finish time will be 3.20pm**.

I am letting you know now as I wanted to give you ample time for the new finishing times.

We sincerely appreciate your understanding and support in this matter. By prioritising the well-being and work-life balance of our dedicated staff, we are fostering an environment that promotes excellence in teaching and learning.

If you have any questions or concerns about the new enterprise agreement or the revised finishing up date, please do not hesitate to reach out to us. Thank you for your continued partnership as we strive to provide an outstanding education for our students.

Wellbeing

Our Wellbeing Learning



This term staff will continue to develop social emotional learning programs using the **Resilience Rights and Respectful Relationships Program** and resources alongside our learning from the **Berry Street Model**. Our focus for Term 3 is to build our ability to tune into our bodies and identify if we are **'Ready to Learn'.** As a staff we have explored that in order for students to be ready to learn they need to

- Know they are safe
- Name emotions
- Identify body responses associated with emotions
- Identify 'tricky' or 'uncomfortable' emotions
- Identify strategies to regulate emotions

In the first two weeks of this term all classes will work with their teacher to explore what it means to be/feel safe at school in an age appropriate way. Each class will construct a definition for being safe at school, work through language and examples or being safe and create a display for the students to reference in the classroom.





NCCD Information Sheet for Parents, Carers and Guardians

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) On School

Students with Disability

What is the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data?

Schools must now complete the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) every year. It counts the number of students who receive additional adjustments or "help" at school because of a disability. The NCCD helps governments plan for the needs of students with disability.

Who is counted in the data collection?

To count a student in the NCCD, schools must think through some key questions:

- 1. Is the student getting help at school so that they can take part in education on the same basis as other students?
- Is the help given because of a disability? The word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability</u> <u>Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA) and it can include many students.
- 3. Has the school talked to you or your child about the help that they provide?
- 4. Has the school kept records about the help they provide, the student needs and the reasons that the student needs this help? The school will need to keep copies of tests, student work, assessments, records of meetings, medical reports or other paperwork and information about how the student's learning is moving along over time.

Once the school decides that the student should be counted in the NCCD, they then choose a disability group and one of four levels of help that has been given to the student.

What does the word 'disability' mean in the NCCD?

In the NCCD the word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA). There are four types of disability that the school can choose from: sensory, cognitive, social-emotional and physical.

Many students that need help at school can be counted in the NCCD. For example, students with learning problems, e.g. specific learning disability or reading difficulty (sometimes called dyslexia), health problems (e.g. epilepsy or diabetes), physical disability (e.g. cerebral palsy), vision/hearing loss and social-emotional problems (e.g. selective mutism, Autism Spectrum Disorder, anxiety).

Letters from doctors or specialists can be very helpful for schools as they plan how to support students with their learning. Schools do not need to have these letters before they can count a

student in NCCD. Teachers can use all that they know about the student's learning and the records that they have collected over time to decide if a student can be counted in the NCCD.

What sort of help does the school give students?

Students need different types of help at school. Some students need a little help sometimes while other students need a lot of help nearly all the time. The type of help given depends on the needs of the student. The help can include changes to the school buildings or grounds (e.g. ramps or things like special desks or chairs), extra teacher help in classes, special learning programs, changes to the work they give the student or extra adult help.

How will the NCCD be different this year?

All schools have been counting students in the NCCD since 2015. The government will use the NCCD data as part of the funding to schools.

What will the school need to know about my child for the NCCD?

Schools work together with families to understand the needs of each child. It is helpful if families give their child's teacher a copy of any letters or reports they have. The letters or reports will help the school understand the child and the help that they might need. Letters from doctors, psychologists, speech pathologists, doctor, and occupational therapists etc. can be very helpful for schools. These reports along with information that the teacher has (i.e. school based tests, your child's work and learning plans) helps the school to understand and meet your child's needs.

What happens to the NCCD data? Who will have the NCCD information?

Each school principal must check the NCCD data in August of each year. The school will give the information to the Catholic Education Office. The school will work with the Catholic Education Office to make sure that the NCCD data is OK before they give the data to the government. The government will not be given the names of any students or any letters or records. Please ask your school for their privacy policy if you need to know more.

Does the school need me to agree with them about counting my child in the NCCD?

Amendments were made to the <u>Australian Education Act 2013</u> and <u>Australian Education Regulation</u> <u>2013</u>]. Schools do not need you to agree to let them count a child in the NCCD. You cannot ask the school not to count your child.

Child Care Subsidy Fact Sheet



More families can now access cheaper child care with TheirCare!

- Families who were previously not eligible for CCS may now be eligible.
- A higher rate of CCS is available for most families that do access CCS.

From 10 July 2023, the Australian Government is changing the Child Care Subsidy (CCS).

What you need to know:

- The family income limit to be eligible for CCS is increasing from \$356,756 to \$530,000 per annum.
- . The maximum amount of CCS is increasing from 85% to 90% for families earning \$80,000 or less.
- · Families earning between \$80,000 and \$530,000 will receive an increased CCS rate.
- Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children can get at least 36 subsidised hours of early childhood education and care per fortnight, regardless of their family's activity level.

What you need to do:

- Not currently registered for CCS? If your family earns below \$530,000, you may be entitled to CCS from 10 July. You should check your eligibility now. Create a Centrelink online account through myGov or the Express Plus Centrelink mobile app.
- Already get CCS? You don't need to do anything to get the new rates. Services Australia will apply CCS changes automatically for you from 10 July.
- Do you have an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander child? You can access at least 36 hours of subsidised care per fortnight, by contacting Services Australia on 136 150 to update your child's CCS details. It is voluntary for you to tell Services Australia this.
- Need extra support with child care fees? If you are eligible for CCS and meet certain criteria you may also be eligible for Additional Child Care Subsidy

Procedure for Reporting an Absence

Thank you to the families that are using the <u>notices@stprepp.catholic.edu.au</u> email account or the 'Report an Absence' link on our website, to notify the school of an absence.

It is not alway possible for teachers to access emails before they mark the morning roll or they may also be absent. By sending an email to the notices email address, the office staff can make sure the roll is updated. Please send an email for each day your child is absent, or specify a date range for their absence. A reason for the absence must be noted.

The exemption from school form is to be completed for students that are absent for more than 10 school days. The form is also available from the school office.

Updating your personal and contact information & changes to student medical conditions

Do we have your most up to date contact details? If not, please contact the school on <u>office@stprepp.catholic.edu.au</u> so we can update our records. This includes parent/carers' name, address, phone numbers, email address and emergency contact details.
